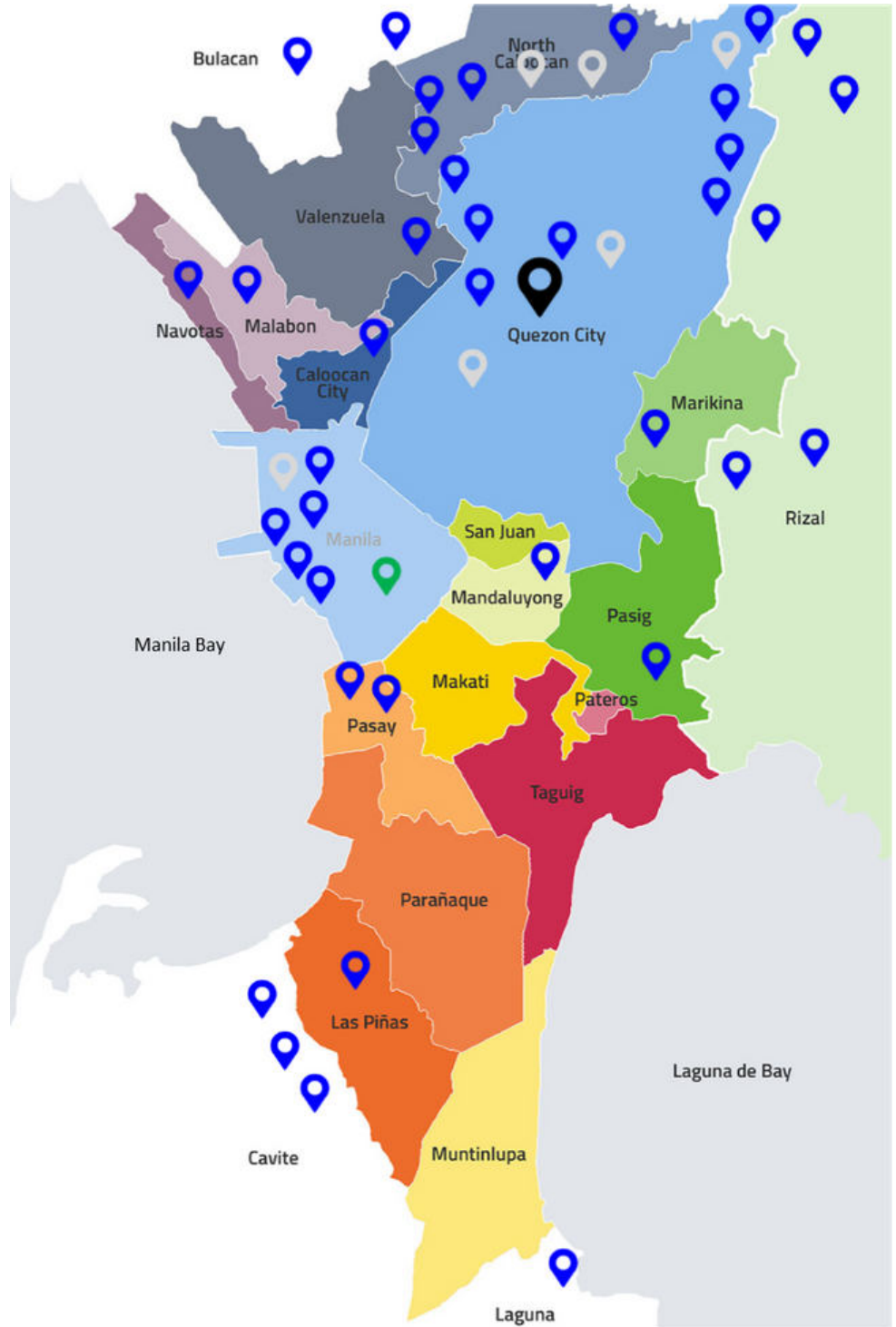

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD

The year 2020 was a time of intense crisis for the nation, with the pandemic causing tremendous disruptions, displacements, losses, and uncertainties, especially to the most vulnerable/poor communities. Within the Onesimo network struggling with financial, mental health, and faith issues were not uncommon.



Despite the challenges of adjustment to the “new normal”, the Onesimo staff and church-based/community partners demonstrated dedication in sustaining our operations and addressing the needs of our beneficiaries. There were 66 trainees served in 5 residential centers, 524 beneficiaries served through our 36 CBM partners, 46 supported in our aftercare program, and 14 trained in Vocation Technology in Matalinting Farm & Camp. We provided support and encouragement to 103 Pastors and church workers through activities such as Pastor/Workers fellowships, retreats, home visitations, etc. We also reached out with welfare assistance to 500 families of our beneficiaries and provided food packs to more than 5000 families during the recent Enhanced Community Quarantine, which is the most restrictive control of population movement amounting to lockdown.

Beyond the numbers, however, our services proved to be very supportive and hope-inspiring, providing a sense of “normalcy” to our beneficiaries during this challenging time. Through our programs and services, we were able to concretize what it means to love God and neighbor. We expressed how it is to be a caring community. This helped people find God in the midst of the pandemic and its severe consequences.

It is sometimes a soul-wrenching experience to reflect on the meaning of the pandemic crisis from a faith perspective. But we are learning to discern God’s invitation for us as a faith community in time such as this. The more we are compelled to live out Jesus’ way of doing ministry.

To all our partners and supporters, may God continue to empower and lead us to creative ways of partnering with Onesimo ministry. God’s grace, peace, and comfort be with us all!

But Covid-19 hit the land! Our plans for 2020 had to be adjusted. Major construction of the long-awaited multi-purpose building was stopped for 2 months and gradually resumed at 50% manpower due to lockdown. The materials became hard to acquire either due to road restrictions or due to unavailability. It should have been finished by April 2020. It is now the end of the year and the project is still ongoing.

To everyone in Onesimo, thank you for being supportive in all arrangements that were made possible. Thank you to the staff who worked remotely, adjusting to the not so conducive working environment, to social workers and house parents who stayed longer days in the center, and to employees who are required to meet with people or government agencies face to face taking the appropriate measures to ensure that their exposure to others is limited as much as possible.

To our prayer partner and supporter, we are grateful for your partnership, sending us your practical ways of caring and compassion. We have taken painstaking measures to ensure continuity of operations, and that our commitments to all who trusted us and to the children and youth are consistently upheld. During the initial onset in 2020, we have implemented plans to deploy the essentials simultaneously to the 51 centers and churches despite community quarantine implementations.

I am thankful to the Board of Trustees, team heads, and their respective team members working together to provide agile and timely solutions that are especially critical at this time.

Onesimo was trusted with funds to distribute relief packs for families lacking food within our many communities. Indeed, God's hand is visible at this time. Blessings to all.

CHURCH-BASED MINISTRY (CBM)

PARTNER CHURCHES

520 Youth at Risk were served
through **45 Partner Churches**

Different rehabilitation programs can play a valuable role in addressing the needs of young people growing up in high-risk environments, especially in this time of the CoViD 19 pandemic – increasing their resilience to poverty and negative influences, helping achieve a transformation in their lives, and their ability to contribute to their communities.

Onesimo Foundation has been silently working for more than two decades through one of its programs – Church-Based Ministry (CBM).

Now in its 9th year, it is constantly connecting and partnering with christian churches in urban poor communities. These are churches and communities that have the same advocacy, mission, and vision of Onesimo for urban poor youth at risk.

2020 was a tough year for everyone, not just in the Philippines but for the whole world. We managed to sign a partnership with 7 urban poor churches and 13 for renewal of the program term despite it. These were through referrals from the current partner churches, visitations, and program orientation. The signing of the contract happened from August to September of 2020 with observed proper protocol and followed quarantine restrictions.

REACH PREVENTION

Program Orientation

It is always overwhelming to adjust to an unfamiliar environment - new people, programs, and routines. You have to get accustomed to a new culture and make yourself familiar with the system. This often becomes time-consuming and very hard without any proper guidance. These are the reasons why we annually conduct Onesimo

Program Orientation with a different set-up which is to adapt to non-face-to-face meetings. We conducted it virtually for 3 whole days within a month, participated by pastors and youth workers, not just for new partners but for all the partners. This also served as a refresher course for them.

Work Camp

By the end of 2020, 181 new beneficiaries joined the CBM program, and 20 minors were admitted to the residential care program.

Due to the changing quarantine restrictions, Onesimo CBM was unable to conduct the usual Work Camp for Batch 9 of beneficiaries but we still managed to reach out to youth at risk through referrals from Alumni, parents from communities, and other organizations. Each partner church found its way to conduct a work camp.

On the other hand, Onesimo Residential girls centers were able to conduct a work camp at Onesimo Farm and Camp Site in the last month of 2020. Participated by 23 girl trainees and 7 staff and volunteers. Everyone enjoyed the activities prepared for them including the farming and the spacious, green environment. Boys' work camp was re-scheduled to January 2021.

REACH REHABILITATION

Few adjustments in purchasing and distributing of needs were made due to the quarantine restrictions:

1. The **Food Budget** was distributed weekly or twice a month by the Community Coordinator through meeting at a place where it is possible to gather at least 7 to 10 people. If not possible, the budget was sent through "Express Padala Center" or Bank Transactions.
2. The **pastors and workers**, accompanied by **community coordinators**, purchased personal hygiene kits, cleaning materials, and food condiments monthly at a grocery store near the vicinity of the church instead of centralized purchasing.
3. The **Clothing Budget** was given twice for the year 2020. ₱500 for October (supposedly July) and ₱1000 for December (bigger amount as part of Christmas gift). The pastors and workers had purchased the items of clothing to avoid exposure and contracting the virus. **Onesimo staff** purchased utensils, mattresses, and indoor games last October and were immediately given to churches.

REACH REHABILITATION

All of Life Graduation

The All of Life Discipleship Program is the first six months of residential trainees' training. In a home and family environment, the children are taught to look after themselves. The children relearn what it means to be in a relationship and a home after coming from the streets where it's "every man for himself" or a rebellious family atmosphere. House cleaning, dishwashing, marketing, and cooking are among the tasks assigned to each person. Personal hygiene, submission, discipline, and relationships are among the skills they mastered. They learned

about Jesus and his love for everyone through Bible reading and research. They gained trust in themselves and empathy for others. They gained a biblical understanding of right and wrong, as well as a stronger understanding of obedience and Jesus Christ's Lordship. This year, twenty-two (22) residential youth completed the All of Life Program. The event took place at Onesimo Training Center. Their relatives, Kuyas and Ates (under consolidation phase), and Onesimo workers all attended the graduation.



Appreciation Day

Thirteen trainees were eventually reunited with their respective families. In Tondo and Mendez Center, we managed to arrange a mini celebration for successfully finishing the 2-year program.

It was a day full of thanksgiving and encouraging words and saying goodbyes, a closure of their stay in the center. Very heartwarming for those leaving and something to look forward to for the trainees awaiting their eventual reintegration, too.

ALTERNATIVE LEARNING SYSTEM (ALS)

CBM

This program continued even after the lockdowns started. Alternative ways were implemented by different learning centers and were acquired by youths such as modular, online classes, and blended learning. A huge difference from normal face-to-face classes of youths with their Instructional Managers (ALS Teacher) because pastors and workers were the ones who focused on assisting youths on their learning process. Their personal phones were used to communicate to youth's teachers for updates and announcements.

It was a difficult time for youths, pastors, and workers since their classes were blended, which means they needed more than just one phone to let all of the youths attend their classes and communicate with teachers. Some of them rented computers on internet cafes (near the church) and some youths borrowed phones from their parents.

These kinds of settings were tempting for youths, having an available communication with their former "barkadas" from the outside or possible involvement in romantic relationships through social networking sites (platforms to communicate with teachers). But thanks to all of the pastors and workers who tried their best to assist and guide the youths on these platforms and letting them use their personal mobile phones.

There are 380 out-of-school youth enrolled in ALS. Some of them left the program too early, due to various reasons.

Survey for the Needs (Adaptability vs. Covid-19 Pandemic)

We surveyed our partner pastors and workers to determine the needs of beneficiaries for ALS and skill training. We discovered that in this CoViD-19 pandemic situation, the best way to adapt to the new normal is to use a computer set. This will be used for online classes as the education system adjusts to the new normal and implements it across the country.

We also discovered that the online learning mode has been implemented in most areas of Metro Manila, where the majority of our partner churches are located. To keep up with this new standard, method, and system, we proposed assisting the 24 identified partner churches in acquiring a computer set.

ALTERNATIVE LEARNING SYSTEM (ALS)

Residential

by Onesimo Adult Education Program (OAEP)

ALS classes were held at the Onesimo office every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday during the year. However, because of Covid-19, face-to-face sessions were halted after the government declared a nationwide Enhance Community Quarantine. This did not negate the clients' ability to avoid learning.



Not only did the clients continued their studies as a result of the distance learning, but we also paid a monthly visit to each center to track and check their performance and output. There were 36 students in all (2 in Basic Literacy Program, 7 in Elementary level, and 27 in Secondary level).

Internet interruption due to bad connection, camera and audio delay, a longer time for individuals due to only one device having an internet connection, and eventually, classroom management changes were all problems in the new normal mode of learning. Despite the fact that the learning system had changed drastically, the clients were overjoyed that they could still obtain their education.

We adapted to the new standard educational environment. In each center, we built two sets of computers to be used in the online class. It has been possible to continue the clients' distance learning due to the generous and extra effort of our social workers and house parents who supported the teacher during the online class.



We also had the opportunity to enroll our clients in June in **Universal Business Academy's English Proficiency Class**. They provided 10 sessions for 30 students for free after being recommended by Bishop Alfred L. Hermosilla. Even though some of the students wanted to quit, we took advantage of the opportunity to allow our clients to work with an international facilitator. We were able to persuade them to complete the sessions because it would help them directly.

EQUIP

SKILLS TRAINING

CBM

This is one of the main goals for each youth who are part of the program. Skills Training or Vocational Education is an essential part of the program, life and need - based education which can convert unskilled and inexperienced youth into human resources or manpower of companies/organizations. The education system in the Philippines has been hit by the pandemic and quarantine restrictions and a lot of experiments were made to cope and adapt to the situation. The year 2020 was the exact time for equipping phase of youths (Batch 8) and for them not to be stagnant.

The youth finished the skills training according to the expertise and available in the area per church. Some had training on welding, baking, coffee

Pastors and workers taught them some alternatives to continue this phase:

Livelihood and Alternative Skills Training

The first resource of pastors and workers was their skills to be taught to youth like “meryenda” (snack) making which is popular in every community and this could be used as their possible livelihood after the program. Another is Carpentry. They took advantage of lockdowns and renovated few areas in their respective churches.

Formal Skills Training

Some churches enrolled and attended the classes before the lockdown started in March. Few instructions were given from their teachers and school administrations to pastors as their guardians on what would be the changes in the system, like reporting of youth to school once a week for their actual training and submission of written reports through printed manuals. In-house training is an alternative where it was brought to churches as their venue of classes. Pastors partnered with skilled instructors who were able to assist and teach youths from course theories to graduation or completion, and also to the processing of National Certificate II which is one of the essential credentials for job applications.

Residential

by OAEP

For most of us, the year 2020 was a difficult transition because everything was new. So, when the third quarter of the year arrived and we were still unable to return to our normal lives, The Skills Coordinator, and the OAEP staff decided to continue with the skills training, even if it meant going online.

In early July, we decided to offer one Skills Training which is Food Processing that was facilitated by a Skills Coordinator. We scheduled a meeting with the house parents and the social workers to finalize the details of this new way of facilitating Skills Training.

We chose to teach Food Processing as a Skills Training course because it will benefit young people with business and can be integrated with Onesimo Farm.

The online class began on July 19, 2020. All students from all phases were included, a total of 37 enrollees for 2020 Skills Training.

We did not go through with the interview process this time because we only offered one course and they did not have a choice of other courses.

We used TESDA as a source and guide because it was unexpected and this program still needed to be given to young people. TESDA provided an online class to help people of all ages learn new skills.

33 *RESIDENTIAL* Trainees

4 *YOUTH* from the Community

37 *Students Overall*

Each student created an account in TESDA where they completed their online quizzes and activities, as well as the lessons, but because our clients are not fluent in English, we guided them by translating it to Filipino and explaining each term they needed to understand in each lesson.

Everything was new for the clients, and most of the time we had trouble connecting to the internet. They struggled to understand the lessons because it was not the typical way of learning, but we eventually overcame and adapted to this trend.

Food Processing

The students completed all six (6) modules in one quarter. Despite the new normal, we were still able to do hands-on activities with the assistance of the guardian in the center. It was too difficult. As much as we wanted to guide the students through every step, we couldn't do so because our mode of learning is online. All six centers were provided with materials, utensils, ingredients, and uniforms.

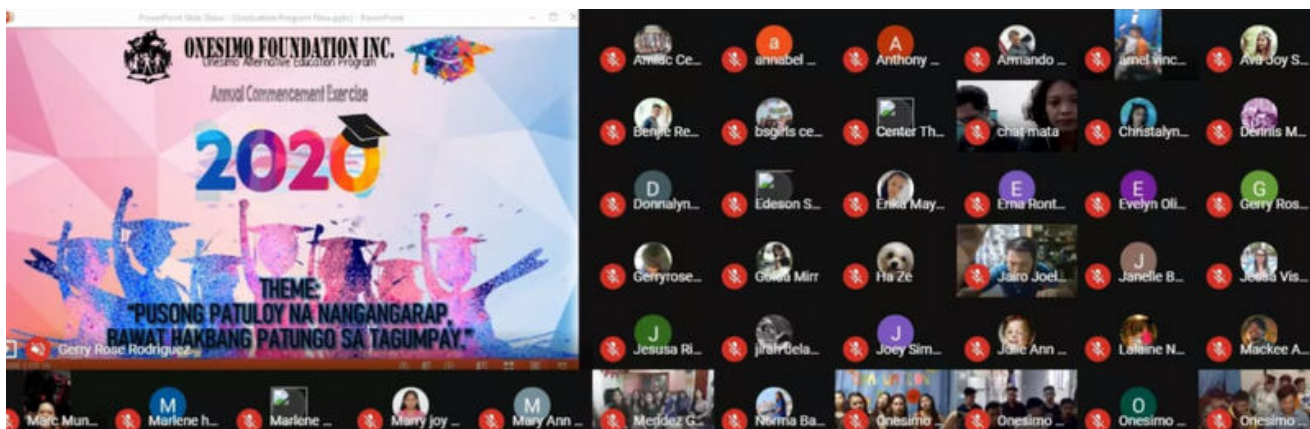


Last day of Online Class

Skills Graduation

Out of 37 students, **35 have completed the training** and appreciated their achievements through an online graduation ceremony on October 30, 2020 with the use of Google Meet. We used the theme “Pusong Nangangarap, Bawat Hakbang Patungo sa Pangarap.” (lit. A heart that dreams, is every step towards the dream.) and a verse of encouragement from Psalms 20:4 (ESV) *“May He grant you your heart’s desire and fulfill all your plans!”*

Sixty-four (64) email accounts were logged in. This may have been the simplest graduation ceremony, but the students were grateful because their parents were present. Ma'am Annabel (Onesimo's current Board Chairwoman) gave the congratulatory remarks. Like most graduations, we were honored to have Dr. Jennifor Aguilar as our guest speaker, who never ceases to inspire young graduates of skills training courses.

PERSONAL ENHANCEMENT LEADERSHIP TRAINING

This year's PELT retreat was difficult because of the pandemic. Despite the challenges, our education department was able to come up with alternative ideas that allowed these activities to take place.

PELT Level 2 Retreat was attended by twenty students. A one-day virtual online retreat was held on June 15, 2020. The theme of the retreat was "Breaking Bad." Then, from December 2-4, 2020, eighteen students attended the PELT Retreat level 1 at Onesimo Farm and Campsite. "No Spiritual Distancing/Closer" was the retreat's theme.



Scholars' Kamustahan

The aim of "Kamustahan" is to keep track of students' progress as they prepare for the upcoming school year while dealing with the pandemic. This includes congratulating Grade 12 graduates and accepting new Grade 11 students.

Since each participant's internet signal was poor, and the dialogue was hazy and ambiguous at times, it was difficult to reach the target. However, we were able to complete the program.

MOBILIZE

TIME TO GO HOME!

This is the last phase of the Onesimo Foundation's program. It is a one-and-a-half-year preparation of the clients' return to their parents and community. In this status, the clients should be living independently and differently from the life they had before entering the program.

After Care Program

"All is Well" - an expression from a movie that later became a statement of Geralyn and other clients in the After Care Program. Especially when Geralyn requires surgery but the hospital refuses to allow her due to protocols. By the grace God, she was admitted to the public hospital with the help of Onesimo friends, and the appendicitis operation was successful.

Geralyn's mother and siblings were overjoyed with her recovery. She graduated from Commonwealth High School with a Hairdressing course, but she never had the opportunity to practice it in the workplace because many beauty parlors had closed down due to the pandemic. For the time being, she works as a nanny to earn for a living.



MOBILIZE

THE LEGAL AGE

It is Arcee Joy Ariola's most awaited moment. She is the eldest of three siblings and comes from a complicated family. Her mother works in another country while his father is incarcerated. She went to her father to assist in the processing of his papers after celebrating her 18th birthday with the Onesimo family. She wants to be with her siblings but since they live with other people, Arcee is looking forward to having a parent at home.

Arcee is grateful for God's grace and wisdom in all she does. She is awaiting the completion of her studies and the acquisition of a job in order to provide for her family's needs.



End Retreat

The retreat happened from January 20 to 25, 2020 at Camp Rock, Puerto Galera, Oriental Mindoro. This is always an exciting activity for the beneficiaries who will graduate from the 2-year program. Batch 7 of beneficiaries were fortunate to experience this camp before the pandemic hit the Philippines. The news about Covid-19 already affecting people all over other countries, and

Puerto Galera is a tourist spot visited by foreigners, made the participants afraid to participate in this event. But we were blessed because we implemented the camp successfully for 19 churches with a total of 116 people - 83 youths, 14 Pastors, and 19 workers. Some youth could not attend the camp for reasons like work, on-the-job training, and skills classes.

Program Extension

The Mobilization phase, the last 4 months of the 2-year program, was affected by the quarantine restrictions. Many establishments were closed and essential shops were the only open stores. Schools were closed, resulting in the classes being on-hold, graduations were cancelled, and many companies postponed the application of work. Opportunities at that time were scarce. These are why Onesimo extended the support for

Due to the pandemic, beneficiaries had no choice but to stay! No job openings for them.

3 months for youth (instead of April 30, we adjusted to July 31) to let the youth have more time to prepare for their Mobilization Phase; think of business proposal or livelihood to learn, practice, and master their skills while inside the churches or be clear on what they wanted to do after the program.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Hip Hop 4 Hope

HipHop 4 Hope paid a visit to Onesimo, and it was a day full of dancing. The youth from our Residential Centers also showed up their talent for dancing. They were initially shy, but thanks to our guests' enthusiasm and versatility, they were finally able to inspire the youth to dance.

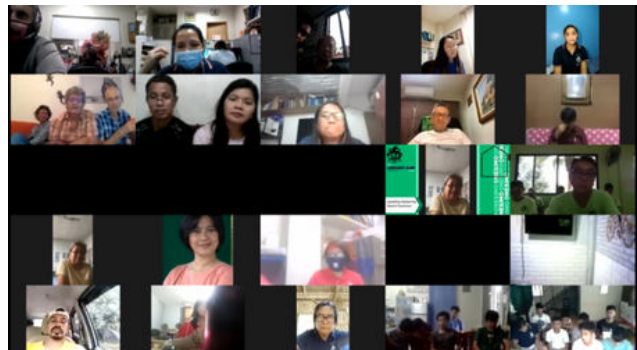

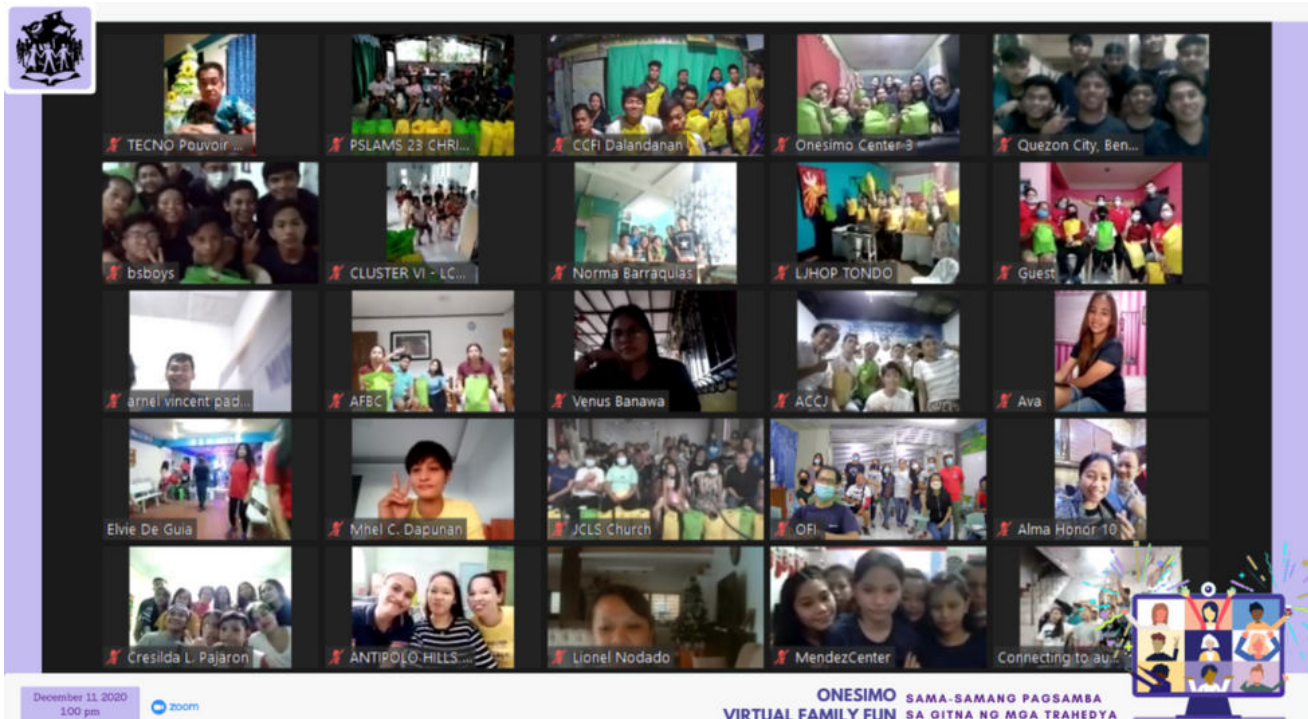
OTHER ACTIVITIES

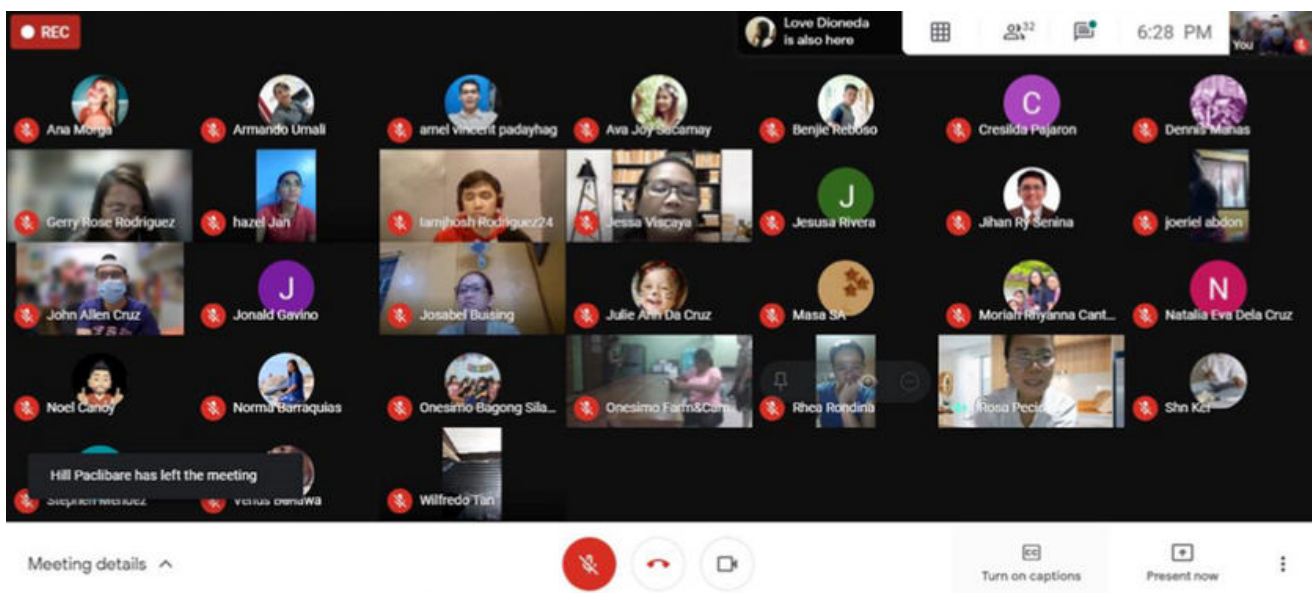

HUMANITARIAN OPERATIONS

Surpassing the challenges of Natural Disasters and Pandemic

Total emergency packs ***distributed*** in partnership with groups, communities, churches: 2,631 families were helped.

- 1,554 food packs to beneficiary families and partner church communities at the peak of COVID-19. Each pack contains 10 kilos of rice and groceries
- 179 packs of food to 179 families affected by the fire in Tondo's densely populated poor area. Each pack contains rice, groceries, and kitchen utensils.
- 469 reliefs for families affected by Typhoon Roly and Ulysses in 4 communities. These families were severely affected during the typhoon. Their belongings were lost to mud floods. We provided mats, blankets, rice, groceries, some eating utensils, and water.
- 429 families received food packs. They were those affected by the Taal Volcano eruption.

Recipient families cannot contain their happiness and were grateful for the timely delivery of foods and supplies.

Flood and Pandemic Relief

After a long period of working at home, it was also refreshing to join the CBM team and After Care in their efforts to assist those who were severely affected by the pandemic and floods that destroyed so many homes. Two of the many affected communities were in Tumana, Bagong Silangan and in Marikina.

On November 11 and 12, 2020. Typhoon Ulysses unleashed powerful winds and torrential rain that killed dozens of people, destroyed thousands of homes, and left swatches of the island region flooded. It became the deadliest tropical cyclone to hit the country by the Year 2020.

The process went well. We followed the quarantine restrictions of each community and also the proper sanitation/hygiene of each family representative.

On December 9 at ACCJ Brgy. Bagong Silangan, 300 families received packs of relief goods. Each pack has a mattress, a blanket, a bottle of water, 4 canned goods, 2 instant noodles, coffee, sugar, and creamer. Another pack is for 10 kilos of rice.

On December 10 at MISC Brgy. Tumana, 100 families received packs of relief goods. Each pack has a mattress, a blanket, a bottle of water, 2 canned goods, 2 instant noodles, coffee, sugar, creamer, and kitchen utensils (5 plates, 2 bowls, 5 cups). Another pack is for 8 kilos of rice.

CAPABILITY BUILDING

Sabbath

Prior to the Pandemic, the program departments went on a Sabbatical Leave to Cebu. They've gone to some well-known places and spent their time relaxing.

Since the ECQ was already in place last May, several departments opted to stay put and spend their sabbath bonding, sharing stories, and enjoying food together.

Staff Retreat

The staff retreat did not happen face-to-face. We did it differently this time. Each staff was given 2 days off to reflect individually and do something that makes them feel happy, relax, and refreshed.

Indeed, each had their own way to retreat from the daily works and stresses brought by the pandemic.

Staff Planning and Evaluation

On September 1-4, Staff Planning and Evaluation happened. It took place virtually and in various locations. The residential staff was joined by our Executive Director, Rose Pecio in Tagaytay, while others preferred to stay at home or in the offices. We were able to immerse

deeper and distinguish the aspects we need to consider and further focus in the program with the guidance of Ate Pine (Onesimo Member), who facilitated the program and activities.

Online Seminars

Each member of the team took the opportunity to attend and learn on the free webinars offered by organizations. Some of the seminars we attended focused on mental health where we gained an understanding of what we're going through and how we can be supportive to each other, such as Enhancing Resilience in The Workplace by Dr. Joan Mae Perez-Rifareal, a psychiatrist organized by Lingap Diwa and Suliranin sa Isip at Utak (lit. mental and brain problems).

We also attended seminars that are relevant to our specific work task like understanding how it is to work from home. Our workers attended seminars as well, for their continuous learning and hearing best practices from other organizations not only to be compliant to the required CPE.

The staff's interest at these virtual sessions grew, and we were able to support each other more particularly at this time of the pandemic. We had an understanding of what we're going through and became supportive of each other.

GLOSSARY

Onesimo, OFI – names for the Onesimo Foundation. Inc.

Residential – youth-at-risk or in-conflict with the law with ages from 14 to 18, cared in a specially designed 2-year course.

CBM – Church-Based Ministry. Major Onesimo Program for eighteen (18) year-olds and above. Churches in urban-poor communities partner with Onesimo that acts as resource providers for CBM to provide manpower and venue.

Aftercare Program - follow-up program seeks to help residential clients fully adapt to family life in their own communities after the 2-year residency has been completed. It consists of a senior social worker and an experienced community worker.

Trainee – usually a youth in the first year of the Onesimo (2-year) Program

Client – a term used for a youth in the Residential program; used to differentiate from the youth enrolled in the CBM program

Kuya, Ate – honorifics given to clients who have completed the first year of the 2-year program. The Kuyas and Ates help take responsibility for guiding trainees through their first steps in the program. They instruct the new ones in the new life, do's and don'ts, and expectations at the work camp. At the residential centers, they serve as models for the trainees. During Summer Youth Camps, they augment the church youth leaders and are given opportunities to enhance their gifts.

Beneficiary – a term used for the youth in the CBM program; used to differentiate from the youth enrolled in the Residential Program

Summer Youth Camps with Onesimo – SYCO (pronounced as /síko/). Started when urban-poor youth are invited from various slum communities in Metro Manila. Now as implemented by Onesimo, partner churches from urban poor communities host week-long summer camps at Onesimo's Camp Rock Retreat Center in Puerto Galera, Mindoro. Onesimo trains camp leaders, and heavily subsidizes camp fees so that urban poor youth may experience God's beautiful creation while being taught God's Word through tailored activities designed to challenge youth to leadership roles in church and community. Coordination meetings for churches and commissioning of youth leaders (with a strict understanding of the Onesimo Child Protection Policy) continue in January & February of the Camp Year. Partnership with churches may go on for 5 years unless terminated due to sub-performance or violations of Onesimo policies.

PELT – Personality Enhancement and Leadership Training 2-year parallel training to Skills and Academics also administered by the OAEP. It has psychological and spiritual components augmenting discipleship which takes place in the residential centers.
